Wegman, William. Cinderella. 1st ed. New York : Hyperion, c1993. In her haste to flee the palace before her fairy godmother's magic loses effect, Cinderella leaves behind a glass slipper. Photographs show the dogs dressed up as the characters in the fairy tale.

398.2 CIN

Edwards, Pamela Duncan. Dinorella : a prehistoric fairy tale. New York : Scholastic Inc., 1998. In this story, loosely based on that of Cinderella but featuring dinosaurs, the Duke falls in love with Dinorella when she rescues him from the dreaded deinonychus at the Dinosaur Dance.

398.2 UCH

Uchida, Yoshiko. The magic purse. 1st ed. New York : Margaret K. McElderry Books : Maxwell Macmillan International, c1993. After facing danger to help a young woman, a poor farmer receives a magic purse that always refills itself with gold.

811 JEF

Seattle, Chief, 1790-1866. Brother eagle, sister sky : a message from Chief Seattle. New York : Dial Books, c1991. A Suquamish Indian chief describes his people's respect and love for the earth, and concern for its destruction.

Prelutsky, Jack. Ride a purple pelican. 1st ed. New York : Greenwillow Books, c1986. A collection of short nonsense verses and nursery rhymes.

Silverstein, Shel. A light in the attic. New York, N.Y. : HarperCollins, c1981. A collection of humorous poems and drawings.

Katz, Susan. A Revolutionary field trip : poems of colonial America. New York : Simon & Schuster Books for Young Readers, 2004. The Revolutionary Mrs. Brown -- Blacksmith

shop -- Cobblestones -- What did colonial kids play? --  
Wooden horse -- Corn planting -- Shearing poor George --  
Sarah spins -- Muster drum -- Ann at the churn -- Grace dips  
a candle -- Signing the Declaration -- Indian hemp -- Dream

Greenwillow Books, c1988. When Leo and Emily decide to open  
their own zoo and charge admission, they encounter a few  
problems, but their families find a unique way to turn  
disaster into success.

#### F BOR

Borden, Louise. The greatest skating race : a WWII Story from  
the Netherlands. New York : Margaret K. McElderry Books,  
2004. During World War II in the Netherlands, a  
ten-year-old boy's dream of skating in a famous race allows  
him to help two children escape to Belgium by ice skating  
past German soldiers and other enemies.

#### F BRA

Bradby, Marie. More than anything else. New York : Orchard  
Books, c1995. Nine-year-old Booker works with his father  
and brother at the saltworks but dreams of the day when  
he'll be able to read.

#### F BUR

Burns, Marilyn, 1941-. Spaghetti and meatballs for all! : a  
mathematical story. New York : Scholastic, c1997. The

seating for a family reunion gets complicated as people rearrange the tables and chairs to seat additional guests.

F FLE

Fleischman, Sid, 1920-. The scarebird. 1st ed. New York : Greenwillow Books, [1988]. A lonely old farmer realizes the value of human friendship when a young man comes to help him and his scarecrow with their farm.

F GAU

Gauch, Patricia Lee. This time, Tempe Wick? New York : Coward, McCann & Geoghegan, [1974]. Everyone knows Tempe Wick is a most surprising girl, but she exceeds even her own reputation when two mutinous Revolutionary soldiers try to steal her beloved horse.

F HER

Herriot, James. Blossom comes home. New York : St Martin's Press, c1988. To make room for a younger cow, Farmer Dakin reluctantly takes his old cow Blossom to market with surprising results.

F HER

Herriot, James. The Market Square dog. New York : St. Martin's Press, c1989. A tale of a stray dog who begs in the village market, is a patient of Herriot's, and is "arrested" by a police officer.

F HER

Herriot, James. Moses the kitten. New York : St. Martins Press, c1984. A bedraggled orphaned kitten is nursed back to health on a Yorkshire farm and when he recovers turns out to have a very unusual idea about the identity of his mother.

F JOH

Johnston, Tony, 1942-. The ghost of Nicholas Greebe. 1st ed. New York : Dial Books for Young Readers, c1996. In Colonial Massachusetts, the ghost of a recently-buried farmer haunts his widow's house after a dog takes one of his bones on a long journey.

F LAS

Lasky, Kathryn. She's wearing a dead bird on her head! 1st ed. New York : Hyperion Books for Children, c1995. A fictionalized account of the activities of Harriet Hemenway and Minna Hall, founders of the Massachusetts Audubon

Society, a late nineteenth-century Audubon Society that would endure and have impact on the bird-protection movement.

F MAR

Martin, Ann M., 1955-. Leo the Magnificat. New York : Scholastic, c1996. A homeless cat wanders in and warms the hearts of the people of a small church.

F NIX

Nixon, Joan Lowery. If you say so, Claude. New York : F. Warne, c1980. Shirley and Claude move across Texas in their covered wagon, looking for a peaceful place to settle down.

F RAP

Rappaport, Doreen. Dirt on their skirts : the story of the young women who won the world championship. 1st ed. New York : Dial Books for Young Readers, c2000. Margaret experiences the excitement of watching the 1946 championship game of the All-American Girls Professional Baseball League as it goes into extra innings.

F VAN

Van Allsburg, Chris. Two bad ants. Boston : Houghton Mifflin, c1988. When two bad ants desert from their colony, they experience a dangerous adventure that convinces them to return to their former safety.

F VAN

Van Allsburg, Chris. Zathura : a space adventure. Boston : Houghton Mifflin, c2002. Left on their own for an evening, two boisterous brothers find more excitement than they bargained for in a mysterious and mystical space adventure board game.

F WEL

Wells, Rosemary. Lassie come home. New York : Scholastic, Inc., 1995.

F WIL

Willard, Nancy. The tortilla cat. 1st ed. San Diego : Harcourt Brace, c1998. When all five Romero children get sick, a magical cat appears in the night and cures them of their fevers.

F YOL

Yolen, Jane. The Mary Celeste : an unsolved mystery from history. New York : Simon & Schuster Books for Young Readers, 1999. A young girl relates the facts that are known about the unexplained disappearance of the crew on the ship Mary Celeste in 1872, and challenges the reader to solve the mystery.

F ZIE

Ziefert, Harriet. Pet day. 1st ed. Boston : Little, Brown, c1987. Mr. Rose brings a variety of creatures to his rambunctious science class on Pet Day and teaches how to handle the little animals.

F ZIE

Ziefert, Harriet. Trip day. Boston : Little Brown, c1987. Mr. Rose's class visits a pond to learn about life in and around the water.

M F LEV

Levy, Elizabeth. Something queer at the haunted school. New York : Dell, 1983, c1982. Two amateur detectives investigate a haunting of their school that starts around Halloween.

M F LEV

Levy, Elizabeth. Something queer in the cafeteria. New York : Hyperion, c1994. Jill and Gwen have never gotten into trouble before, but suddenly every time they're in the cafeteria, something goes terribly wrong.

P ACK

Ackerman, Karen, 1951-. Song and dance man. New York : Knopf : Distributed by Random House, c1988. Grandpa demonstrates for his visiting grandchildren some of the songs, dances, and jokes he performed when he was a vaudeville entertainer.

P BAN

Banks, Kate, 1960-. The cat who walked across France. 1st ed. New York : Frances Foster Books, 2004. After his owner dies, a cat wanders across the countryside of France, unable to forget the home he had in the stone house by the edge of the sea.

P BAR

Barasch, Lynne. Radio rescue. 1st ed. New York : Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 2000. In 1923, after learning Morse code

and setting up his own amateur radio station, a twelve-year-old boy sends a message that leads to the rescue of a family stranded by a hurricane in Florida. Based on experiences of the author's father.

P BLA

Blackstone, Stella. My granny went to market : a round-the-world counting rhyme. Cambridge, MA : Barefoot Books, 2005. Granny travels around the world, buying things in quantities that illustrate counting from one to ten.

P BRA

Bradman, Tony. It came from outer space. 1st ed. New York : Dial Books for Young Readers, 1992. A visitor from outer space visits an elementary school class and brings an important message about physical beauty.

P BRE

Brett, Jan, 1949-. Comet's nine lives. New York : G.P. Putnam's, c1996. Comet the cat uses up eight of his nine lives trying to find the right place to live on Nantucket Island.

P BRE

Brett, Jan, 1949-. Daisy Comes Home. New York : G.P. Putnam's, c2002. Daisy, an unhappy hen in China, floats down the river in a basket and has an adventure.

P BRI

Brinckloe, Julie. Fireflies! : story and pictures. 1st Aladdin ed. New York : Aladdin Books, 1986, c1985. On a magical summer night, a little boy catches hundreds of fireflies in a large jar, and as their light fades, must decide whether to keep them or set them free.

P BUE

Buehner, Caralyn. Fanny's dream. 1st ed. New York : Dial Books for Young Readers, c1996. Fanny Agnes is a sturdy farm girl who dreams of marrying a prince, but when her fairy godmother doesn't show up, she decides on a local farmer instead.

P BUN

Bunting, Eve, 1928-. A picnic in October. 1st ed. San Diego : Harcourt Brace, c1999. A boy finally comes to understand why his grandmother insists that the family come to Ellis

Island each year to celebrate Lady Liberty's birthday.

P BUN

Bunting, Eve, 1928-. The Wednesday surprise. New York : Clarion Books, c1989. On Wednesday nights when Grandma stays with Anna everyone thinks she is teaching Anna to read.

P CAL

Calmenson, Stephanie. The principal's new clothes. New York : Scholastic, 1989. In this version of the Andersen tale the vain principal of P.S. 88 is persuaded by two tailors that they will make him an amazing, one-of-a-kind, suit that will be visible only to intelligent people who are good at their jobs.

P CHI

Child, Lauren. Who's afraid of the big bad book? 1st American ed. New York : Hyperion Books for Children, 2003. A boy who loves books but has not always treated them well falls asleep and finds himself in his book of fairy tales, where his interaction with everyone from Goldilocks to Cinderella wreaks havoc.

P CLE

Clements, Andrew, 1949-. Double trouble in Walla Walla. Brookfield, Conn : Millbrook Press, c1997. It's an ordinary morning in Walla Walla until Lulu, her teacher, the school nurse, and the principal are all infected by a word warp which makes them reduplicate everything they say.

P FIN

Finchler, Judy. Miss Malarkey won't be in today. 1st pbk. ed. New York : Walker, 2000, 1998. A teacher imagines the chaos that takes place when she stays home one day because she is sick.

P FIN

Finchler, Judy. You're a good sport, Miss Malarkey. New York : Walker, 2002. The children on a newly formed soccer team love their coach, Miss Malarkey, who doesn't know much about the game except how to make it fun, but the school principal and parents have other ideas.

P GAI

Gaiman, Neil. The wolves in the walls. 1st ed. New York : HarperCollins, 2003. Lucy is sure there are wolves living

in the walls of her house, although others in her family disagree, and when the wolves come out, the adventure begins.

P GAR

Garcia, Carolyn. Moonboy. Hillsboro, OR : Beyond Words Pub., 1999. The son of the Man in the Moon has no one to play with, so he goes down to earth to make some friends.

P GEE

Geeslin, Campbell. Elena's serenade. 1st ed. New York : Atheneum Books for Young Readers, c2004. In Mexico, a little girl goes on a journey to learn to be a glassblower and gains confidence along the way.

P GER

Gerstein, Mordicai. The man who walked between the towers. 1st ed. Brookfield, Conn. : Roaring Brook Press, c2003. A lyrical evocation of Philippe Petit's 1974 tightrope walk between the World Trade Center towers.

P HAY

Hayes, Joe. A spoon for every bite. New York : Orchard Books, c1996. A poor husband and wife ask their rich neighbor to be godfather of their child, and once they are compadres, prey upon his pride and extravagance to trick him out of his fortune.

P HEA

Hearne, Betsy Gould. Seven brave women. 1st ed. New York : Greenwillow Books, c1997. A young girl recounts the brave exploits of her female ancestors, including her great-great-great grandmother who came to America in a wooden sailboat.

P HEI

Heide, Florence Parry. The day of Ahmed's secret. New York : Lothrop, c1990. Ahmed rides his donkey cart throughout the city of Cairo, hurrying to finish his work, so he can return home and share his secret with his family.

P HES

Hesse, Karen. The cats in Krasinski Square. 1st ed. New York : Scholastic Press, 2004. Two Jewish sisters, escapees of the infamous Warsaw ghetto, devise a plan to thwart an attempt by the Gestapo to intercept food bound for starving people

behind the dark Wall.

P HOP

Hopkinson, Deborah. Apples to Oregon : being the (slightly) true narrative of how a brave pioneer father brought apples, peaches, pears, plums, grapes, and cherries (and children) across the plains. 1st ed. New York : Atheneum Books for Young Readers, c2004. A pioneer father transports his beloved fruit trees and his family to Oregon in the mid-nineteenth century. Based loosely on the life of Henderson Luelling.

P ICH

Ichikawa, Satomi. The first bear in Africa! New York : Philomel Books, 2001. The animals of the African savanna help Meto as he tries to return the toy bear left behind by a young tourist.

P JOH

Johnson, D.B. (Donald B.), 1944-. Henry hikes to Fitchburg. Boston : Houghton Mifflin, c2000. While his friend works hard to earn the train fare to Fitchburg, young Henry walks the thirty miles through woods and fields, taking the opportunity to enjoy nature. Includes biographical information on Henry David Thoreau.

P JOH

Johnson, D. B. (Donald B.), 1944-. Henry works. Boston : Houghton Mifflin, 2004. On a misty morning, Henry, a bear modeled after Henry David Thoreau, shows his awareness of nature as he helps neighbors during his walk to work.

P KEI

Keillor, Garrison. Cat, you better come home. New York : Viking, 1995. Dissatisfied with her life, Puff the cat leaves home and becomes a rich and glamorous model, but eventually returns having found out that it's better to be who you are.

P KIU

Kyuchukov, Khristo. My name was Hussein. 1st ed. Honesdale, Pa. : Boyds Mills Press, 2004. When an army invades a village, a Muslim boy and his family are forced to take Christian names.

P KOC

Koch, Ed, 1924-. Eddie : Harold's little brother. New York : G. P. Putnam's Sons, c2004. Eddie wants to be like his big brother, a very good athlete, but is not good at sports, so Harold helps him discover how to use his own special talent--talking.

#### P LEA

Leaf, Margaret. Eyes of the dragon. 1st ed. New York : Lothrop, 1987. An artist agrees to paint a dragon on the wall of a Chinese village, but the magistrate's insistence that he paint eyes on the dragon has amazing results.

#### P LIN

Lindbergh, Reeve. Johnny Appleseed : a poem. 1st ed. Boston : Joy Street Books, c1990. Rhymed text and illustrations relate the life of John Chapman, whose distribution of apple seeds and trees across the Midwest made him a legend and left a legacy still enjoyed today.

#### P LUE

Luenn, Nancy. Mother earth. 1st ed. New York : Toronto : New York : Atheneum ; Maxwell Macmillan Canada ; Maxwell Macmillan International, 1992. Describes the gifts the Earth gives its inhabitants and the contributions people can give back to the planet.

#### P LYO

Lyon, George Ella, 1949-. Who came down that road? New York : Orchard Books, c1992. Mother and child ponder the past in discussing who might have traveled down an old, old road, looking backwards from pioneer settlers all the way to prehistoric animals.

#### P MAD

Madonna, 1958-. Mr. Peabody's Apples / by Madonna ; art by Loren Long. 1st ed. New York : Callaway : Distributed in the U.S. by Viking Children's Books, 2003. A boy learns a lesson about the destructive power of gossip.

#### P MAH

Mahy, Margaret. The rattlebang picnic. 1st ed. New York : Dial Books for Young Readers, c1994. The McTavishes, their seven children, and Granny McTavish take their old rattlebang of a car on a picnic up Mount Fogg and have an exciting adventure.

P MAJ

Major, Beverly. Playing sardines. New York : Scholastic Inc., c1988. As soon as they find the hider, neighborhood youngsters squeeze like sardines into one tight spot in this twist on the classic hide-and seek game.

P MAL

Maltbie, P. I. Picasso and Minou. Watertown, MA : Charlesbridge Pub Inc, c.2005. The artist Pablo Picasso's cat Minou influences him to discontinue his Blue Period style of painting to begin creating works that will sell more quickly.

P MCC

McCloskey, Robert. Make way for ducklings. Puffin Books, c1976.

P MCC

McCully, Emily Arnold. Mirette on the high wire. New York : G.P. Putnam's Sons, c1992. Mirette learns tightrope walking from Monsieur Bellini, a guest in her mother's boarding house, not knowing that he is a celebrated tightrope artist who has withdrawn from performing because of fear.

P MCC

McCully, Emily Arnold. Starring Mirette and Bellini. New York : G.P. Putnam's Sons, c1997. After the Great Bellini teaches young Mirette to walk the high wire, she uses her talent to free him from prison, and both resolve to help others become free.

P MCC

McCourt, Lisa. Chicken soup for little souls : The best night out with Dad. Deerfield Beach, Fla : Health Communications, c1997. When he realizes that little Vincent's father can't afford to pay for circus tickets, Danny must decide whether to share his tickets or to use them himself.

P MCC

McCourt, Lisa. Chicken soup for little souls. : The never-forgotten doll. Deerfield Beach, Fla : Health Communications, c1997. Miss Ellie's love for Miss Maggie, her babysitter, helps her find a way to give Miss Maggie the best birthday present ever.

P MCD

McDonald, Megan. My house has stars. New York : Orchard Books,

c1996. Young people describe the different kinds of homes they live in around the world--all under the stars.

P MCD

McDonnell, Patrick, 1956-. Art. 1st ed. New York : Little, Brown, c2006. A rhyming tribute to a budding young artist.

P MCL

McLerran, Alice, 1933-. The year of the ranch. New York : Viking, c1996. In 1919 Papa, Mama, and their four daughters homestead a tract of land near Yuma, Arizona, and try to turn a desert mesa into farmland and a shack into a home.

P MCP

McPhail, David M. Edward and the pirates. 1st ed. Boston : Little, Brown, c1997. Once Edward has learned to read, books and his vivid imagination provide him with great adventures.

P MIT

Mitchell, Margaree King. Uncle Jed's barbershop. New York : Simon & Schuster Books for Young Readers, c1993. Despite serious obstacles and setbacks, Sarah Jean's Uncle Jed, the only black barber in the county, pursues his dream of saving enough money to open his own barbershop.

P MOB

Mobin-Uddin, Asma. My name is Bilal. 1st ed. Honesdale, Pa. : Boyds Mills Press, 2005. When Bilal and his sister transfer to a school where they are the only Muslims, they must learn how to fit in while staying true to their beliefs and heritage.

P MOS

Moss, Marissa. In America. 1st ed. New York : Dutton Children's Books, c1994. While Walter and his grandfather walk to the Post Office, Grandfather recounts how he decided to come to America, while his brother Herschel stayed in Lithuania.

P NEG

Negron, Ray. The boy of steel : a baseball dream come true. 1st ed. New York : ReganBooks, c2006. A young boy stricken with cancer has his dream come true when he gets to be a Yankee batboy for a day.

P NEW

Newman, Nanette. Spider the horrible cat. 1st U.S. ed. San Diego : Harcourt Brace Jovanovich, 1993. A bad-tempered cat becomes a hero when he saves his mistress's life.

P NOL

Nolen, Jerdine. Harvey Potter's balloon farm. 1st ed. New York : Lothrop, Lee & Shepard Books, c1994. A child ventures out in the middle of the night to see how Harvey Potter grows his wonderful balloons.

P NUM

Numeroff, Laura Joffe. If you take a mouse to school. 1st ed. New York : Laura Geringer Book, c2002. Follows a boy and his mouse through a busy day at school.

P PAR

Park, Frances, 1955-. Where on earth is my bagel? 1st ed. New York : Lee & Low Books, 2001. When a young boy in Korea dreams of eating a New York bagel, he asks a farmer, a fisherman, a beekeeper, and a baker for help.

P PAT

Paterson, John (John Barstow). Blueberries for the Queen. 1st ed. [New York] : HarperCollins, c2004. In the summer of 1942, when Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands lives down the road from his family's house in Massachusetts, young William decides to take her some of the blueberries he has picked. Includes historical notes.

P PEN

Penner, Fred. The cat came back. 1st ed. New Milford, Conn : Roaring Brook Press, c2005. A persistent and indestructible cat keeps coming back, despite his owner's attempts to give him away.

P PIT

Pittman, Helena Clare. Still-life stew. 1st ed. New York : Hyperion Books for Children, c1998. Rosa grows a variety of bright and beautiful vegetables, picks them, paints a picture, and then makes them into a tasty stew.

P PIU

Piumini, Roberto. Doctor Me Di Cin. 1st U.S. ed. [Asheville, NC] : Front Street/Lemniscaat, 2001. The son of the emperor of China is pale and weak, but when Doctor Me Di Cin tells

him to go for a walk in the fresh air, the prince refuses, leaving it up to the clever doctor to trick him into going outside.

P POL

Polacco, Patricia. The bee tree. New York : Philomel Books, c1993. To teach his granddaughter the value of books, a grandfather leads a growing crowd in search of the tree where the bees keep all their honey.

P POL

Polacco, Patricia. My rotten redheaded older brother. New York : Simon & Schuster Books for Young Readers, c1994. After losing running, climbing, throwing, and burping competitions to her obnoxious older brother, a young girl makes a wish on a falling star.

P POM

Pomeranc, Marion Hess. The American Wei. Morton Grove, Ill. : A. Whitman, c1998. When Wei Fong loses his first tooth while going to his family's naturalization ceremony many soon-to-be Americans join in the search.

P RAT

Rathmann, Peggy. Officer Buckle and Gloria. New York : Putnam's, c1995. The children at Napville Elementary School always ignore Officer Buckle's safety tips, until a police dog named Gloria accompanies him when he gives his safety speeches.

P RED

Reddix, Valerie, 1955-. Dragon kite of the autumn moon. New York : Lothrop, 1992. When his grandfather is sick, Tad-Tin goes out to fly his special dragon kite, so that it can take all their troubles away with it.

P REY

Reynolds, Peter, 1961-. The dot. 1st ed. Cambridge, Mass. : Candlewick Press, 2003. Vashti believes that she cannot draw, but her art teacher's encouragement leads her to change her mind.

P REY

Reynolds, Peter, 1961-. Ish. 1st ed. Cambridge, Mass. : Candlewick Press, 2004. Ramon loses confidence in his ability to draw, but his sister gives him a new perspective

on things.

P REY

Reynolds, Peter, 1961-. So few of me. 1st ed. Cambridge, Mass. : Candlewick Press, 2006. After wishing there were two of him to complete all the items on his "to do" list, Leo discovers that the real problem is not the number of Leos, but the length of the list.

P ROH

Rohmann, Eric. My Friend Rabbit. 1st ed. Brookfield, Connecticut : Roaring Brook Press, c2002. Something always seems to go wrong when Rabbit is around, but Mouse lets him play with his toy plane anyway because he is a good friend.

Rylant, Cynthia. The relatives came. New York : Bradbury Press, c1985. The relatives come to visit from Virginia and everyone has a wonderful time.

P RYL

Rylant, Cynthia. In November. San Diego, CA : Harcourt Brace, 2000. Describes the autumn activities and traditions that November's cooling temperatures bring.

P SCI

Scieszka, Jon. The frog prince, continued. New York : Viking, 1991. After the frog turns into a prince, he and the Princess do not live happily ever after and the Prince decides to look for a witch to help him remedy the situation.

P SCI

Scieszka, Jon. The Stinky Cheese Man and other fairly stupid tales. New York, N.Y. : Viking, 1992. Madcap revisions of familiar fairy tales.
